# **Happenings**



This month, a new clothing drop box was unveiled at Noor Orientals Rugs, Inc. during a ribbon cutting ceremony on September 18th 2015. All are welcome to donate clothing in good condition, knowing that their heartfelt gift will help fulfill the mission of addressing persistent income inequality in our community, and will keep many warm this upcoming winter. The ceremony was made possible through the perseverance and coordination of Ms. Mackenzie Bigelow of Leader Bank, who reflected upon the event as one which "made [her] feel incredibly hopeful when . . . people . . . try to help, inspire, and make a better world every day."

The issue of income inequality in Cambridge, MA was touched upon by Mayor Maher, Councilman McGovern, Sergeant Wilson, WANG YMCA Director Patricia Barnwell, Peter Grossi, Barrett Deros, Daniel Muneramesa, and Rick Rubinstein. Their words evoked a powerful message on the importance of treating every member of our community with dignity, respect, and love. This love for others must extend beyond the close proximity of our neighbors, and encompass an awareness of the needs of all.

Mayor Maher introduced a thought-provoking question by asking "how crucial is it for individuals and small businesses to address the most pressing needs in our community?" To this, a speaker replied "every minute of such participation saves a tax dollar, securing safety in our community without law-enforcement." Sergeant Wilson similarly commented that the safety and well-being of the community is placed in the hands of all individuals. Indeed, the government, as a single institution, is limited, and the support of individuals and businesses is vital for community betterment.

Councilman McGovern also noted the growing economic disparity between those of higher and lower income and how today, even with jobs and housing,

people can struggle to sustain their families with food, clothes, and other necessities. Statistically, he emphasized that to survive with even just the basic necessities of livina Cambridge, a family of four needs to make around \$108,000 annually. This high cost of living makes community essential support like the drop box in Noor Oriental Rugs. Councilman McGovern further reflected on his own



community service experiences, what they taught him, and how he has come to the conclusion that income inequality and high living costs in Cambridge require support both for those under and over the federal poverty line.

In addition to the contributions from the above individuals, volunteers from the Sufi Service Committee offered a spiritual viewpoint on charity work. Their presence portrayed a united, strong bond among those who share similar sentiments of love and a sense, as Daniel Muneramesa puts it, that "the inequality has to end!" Peter Grossi explained that part of the solution to ending today's current income inequality can be addressed in the structure of charitable organizations. When charity campaigns, such as those of the Sufi Service Committee, have a spiritual background, the poor become the genuine

focus of the organization. Without such background, "a charity organization may lead to an empire of directors and well-paid employees leaving the cause of the poor in the crucible of oblivion altogether!" said Grossi.

Barrett Deros expressed the idea that charity should be about embracing the needy with love, and that such love radiates in ceremonies such as this. What distinguishes charity work of the Sufi Service is that the volunteers truly care for and support one another, and those to whom they lend a helping hand. Rick Rubinstein, a dedicated volunteer, added "You, the volunteers, are the beating heart of this! I am proud to know you all." His words echo the way in

which true charity should be performed: with a genuine love both towards those in need of help and those who happily give their help. That is what keeps supporters coming back. Volunteers are the true assets of charity work, the heart and soul of its success.
